A BIT OF THIS AND THAT


In 1949 the first production Citroen 2CVs were manufactured after being displayed at the Paris Motor Show in 1948 and continued in production into 1990.

Sun's Rays Converted to Electrical Energy That Runs a Midget Motor



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Sunshine can be used as a source of electric power, according to J. Thomas Rhamstine of Harlingen, Tex., who is building "solar motors" to prove his theory. When the sunrays strike a special metal disk they are converted into electrical energy, according to Rhamstine. In the models, the output is measured in microwatts and is used to turn a tiny motor.

Crepe Tape Made of Wood Is More Durable Than Paper

Colored decorative tape made of wood cut in very thin slices is being produced in Japan as a substitute for crepe-paper tape. It is described as more durable and less expensive than the paper variety sold in that country. Less inflammable than crepe paper, the wooden tape is also moisture resistant.

POPULAR MECHANICS

This 1949 device could be a thermopile, which works by the movement of electrons between dissimilar metals heated by the suns rays.

Another material, Selenium, was known to generate electrical current from sunlight in the mid 1800s and Bell laboratories envisaged solar panels of selenium competing with Edison's coal fired power plant. The efficiency has gradually increased from 1% until mid 1900s when efficiency reached 6% and from around 2000, 23% became achievable and solar panels were gradually introduced for household and commercial applications.
